

Spotlight on a Researcher: Lauren Martin, PhD

Lauren Martin is an associate professor in the School of Nursing at the University of Minnesota. Her work uses qualitative, mixed-methods, collaborative and action research rooted in strengths, assets, meaning-making and experience to explore the ways that trading sex is a critical community health challenge, intertwined within other forms of structural oppression and violence. Specifically, Lauren works in collaborative teams to



understand how the sex trades impact children and families, communities of color, indigenous people and other marginalized groups. She started this work with community partners in 2005. Lauren uses a community engaged and participatory action research approach in her work. Many people involved in transactional sex are marginalized and do not trust institutions, helping professions, law enforcement and researchers. In her work, Lauren has found that engaged approaches to research on sex trading, human trafficking, and community wellbeing are essential in order to build trust and engage people with lived experience in meaning-making. When those with lived experience who are most proximal to the issue are involved in research, we can better illuminate real-world implications, policy, prevention, and community health. Her most recent work focuses on three projects: (1) exploring the prevalence of sex trading among high school students, prevention, youth development and youth voice; (2) transdisciplinary research to develop mathematical models that identify the best ways to disrupt and dismantle trafficking operations; and (3) community-based work lead by Liberty Community Church's Northside Healing Space to promote rest, remembrance, resistance and revival for community healing from historical and racialized trauma leading to the sex trade. For almost 10 years, Lauren was the Director of Research at the University of Minnesota's Urban Research and Outreach-Engagement Center (UROC); and she is an affiliated faculty member of UROC as well as at the Humphrey School of Public Affairs. In 2016, she was the recipient of the University of Minnesota, President's Engaged Scholar award. She conducts a wide range of communitybased research on trauma, education, community development and more. Lauren received her PhD in Anthropology from the New School for Social Research in New York City. Her personal research mission is to co-create empirical knowledge in service of effective social change for justice and equity.
