Sometimes, there are also significant differences between the kinds of questions scholars generate and pursue, and the kinds of questions at the forefront of the minds of people in other types of anti-trafficking work outside academia. Such differences point to the need for us to be publicly-engaged as we design and conduct research and seek ways to communicate our findings across professions and sectors. Let's help each other identify implications of our research for improving the anti-trafficking movement! It was a pleasure to discuss engaged scholarship and translational research with some of you during the GAHTS July Webinar I co-led with Kelsey Morgan. The upcoming virtual International Human Trafficking & Social Justice Conference slated for 22-24 September, 2021 will offer terrific opportunities for new and established scholars to both exchange research findings with each other as well as with practitioners and policymakers- and to think together about questions that have yet to be pursued.

Summer 2021: Volume 3, Issue 2 **Spotlight on a Researcher:** Charles Hounmenou, PhD

Charles Hounmenou has been an Assistant Professor at the Jane Addams College of Social Work, University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC) since 2015. He received his doctoral degree in social work from UIC in 2009. Dr. Hounmenou's scholarship is focused on human trafficking in the United States and sub-Saharan Africa. In 2009, Dr. Hounmenou conducted the first ever study on coalitions'



input in the implementation of human trafficking policy in the United States. The study examined the input of over 100 organizations in the activities of a statewide coalition in the Midwest region of the US, and inherent issues to be addressed to make it effective. Subsequently, thanks to this study, the state was successful in securing a federal grant to restructure the coalition for better goal attainment. In 2013-2014, Dr. Hounmenou conducted a comparative study of child sex trafficking and its links with child migration in Benin, Burkina Faso, and Niger in West Africa. He engaged 133 major stakeholders in the process of this research in which 709 child victims of sex trafficking participated. Direct involvement of key stakeholders in the research process has been analyzed in his 2020 article, "Engaging anti-human trafficking stakeholders in the research process," in the Journal of Human Trafficking. This article allows learning about an effective strategy to actively involve key stakeholders in all five key stages of a research process about trafficking. In his latest research, Dr. Hounmenou explored the awareness and experiences of private investigators (PIs) in the US, Canada, and Australia about human trafficking and collaboration with law enforcement regarding human trafficking. This pioneering research documents distinctive strengths and skills PIs bring to trafficking investigations, including surveillance, advanced interviewing skills, skip tracing, infiltration of criminal groups, and a victim-centered approach. Capitalizing on this recent work, Dr. Hounmenou is developing a full-scale study project to better understand interagency collaboration between PIs and law enforcement aiming at improving human trafficking investigations. In partnership with the Aangan Trust, a major community-based organization in Mumbai, India, Dr. Hounmenou is conducting an evaluation of Aangan's community model to empower and engage over 5,000 children rescued from child forced labor and child marriage in seven provinces in India over the period of 2016-2020. The project will have international practice and research implications. Dr. Hounmenou's scholarly work has earned him the International Human Trafficking & Social Justice Conference Influential Scholar Award (2018) and the UIC Office of the Vice Chancellor for Research's Rising Star Award (2019) in Social Sciences. His record of pioneering scholarship shows his subject matter expertise and commitment to the field of human trafficking.
