

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Introduction to the Summer 2022 Newsletter

Dear GAHTS Members,

This is perhaps an atypical start to a GAHTS introduction letter, but I write to you with very mixed emotions. For context, I am a white, Hispanic, cisgender woman, and a multi-lingual dual citizen. I am aware of the extensive privileges I have on a local and global scale. Like my colleagues around the world, I have watched countless attacks on human rights: in the U.S. alone, where I currently live and conduct most

of my research, we have seen, among many other possible examples, the overturning of Roe v. Wade (thereby restricting access to important healthcare options for pregnant people), countless policies that attack the rights of trans and gender expansive people, violent systems that continue to cause serious harm toward Black and Brown people, and increasing disparities stemming from the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. I am devastated as a human and as a parent of two female children, but importantly for this letter, I also continue to fear the problematic impact of these and other issues on many communities, including those who have been trafficked or who are at risk of trafficking. In the face of these seemingly insurmountable, oppressive social problems, the question I continue to ask myself in my work is: How do we co-create meaningful, actionable human trafficking research that furthers social justice by improving practice and policy, while dismantling the systems of oppression that heighten risk for people around the world?

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Spotlight on a Researcher:

Glenn Miles, PhD, MSc, FRCPH, FHEA PGCE-PCET, RN-A, RSCN

Glenn Miles is a Senior Researcher with <u>up! International</u> and is Research Associate at <u>Oxford Centre for Mission Studies</u>. He is a child health nurse with around 30 years experience focused on child abuse and exploitation in SE Asia. He does independent research, advocacy, training, and evaluation of programs. He has pioneer led several



INGO's and projects in Cambodia (<u>Servants to Asia's Urban Poor</u>, <u>Tearfund UK</u>, and <u>Love146</u>) and has facilitated a series of research projects listening to survivors of sexual exploitation, including prostituted men, women, boys, girls, and transgender and male sex buyers. He is the academic research advisor for the <u>Chab Dai Butterfly ten year Longitudinal Research Project</u>.

In the past year, Glenn has done consultation work with Tearfund UK and Nazarene Compassion Ministries. He teaches up to the PhD level and provides PhD supervision for Holistic Child Development students at Asia Pacific Nazarene Theological Seminary (APNTS) and Ethiopia Theological College (ETI). His current research interests are sexual exploitation of boys and young men including thru the use of the internet, familial sexual exploitation and trafficking of young boys, labor exploitation of children in tea plantations in Sri Lanka, spirituality, and child participation/co-production. He is also doing a series of research with European Freedom Network regarding Christian men on their sexual behavior, including porn use and sexual exploitation. He has completed this in the UK and Germany and hopes to complete this in the Netherlands next.

He is an active member of the <u>European Freedom Network</u> (EFN), <u>Human Trafficking</u> <u>Research Network</u>, <u>Our Voices University Network</u> (OVUN), <u>South-to-South Institute</u> (SSI), and the <u>Global Learning Community</u> (GLC). He is a trustee of <u>Chab Dai</u> and on the advisory board of Flint, a project of Azalea, which is for male sex addicts of the sex trade.

Glenn also runs the <u>Abolitionist Book Club</u> (ABC) since the beginning of COVID-19, which provides a space for practitioners and researchers to keep up-to-date with current research on topics around sexual exploitation and trafficking.

He is the Co-Editor with Christa Foster Crawford of "Stopping the Traffick: A Christian Response to Sexual Exploitation & Trafficking" (Regnum 2014) and "Finding our Way Through the Traffick: Navigating our way through the complexities of a Christian response to sexual exploitation and Human Trafficking" (Regnum 2017). Awaiting publication is "Stepping out of the Traffic: theological reflections on human trafficking and sexual exploitation" (Regnum 2022). Glenn has also been helping to develop a series of toolkits aimed at children in the form of large flip-books. <u>Good Touch Bad Touch</u> is for prevention of sexual abuse and trafficking and has been modified for different contexts and translated into a wide range of Asian languages and now some African languages. <u>Youth Against Pornography</u> is to encourage children to make good decisions when accessing porn. There are three other flip-books in process, including one called "<u>Welcome</u>" for refugee children in transit to a host country, one aimed at boys on the <u>challenges of recovering from sexual abuse and exploitation</u>, and a further called "<u>Sweetheart</u>" aimed at young school girls at risk of being trafficked by young men posing as boyfriends.

Glenn Miles is a Senior Researcher Scholar of GAHTS and recently was voted to become a member of GAHTS' Executive Committee. He is also a member of GAHTS' newly formed Networking Workgroup. Glenn recently completed three training videos with fellow GAHTS member, Jarrett Davis, to help educate up-and-coming researchers in the Emancipation Nation Network, including "Introduction to Research", "Research Ethics", and "Translating Research".
